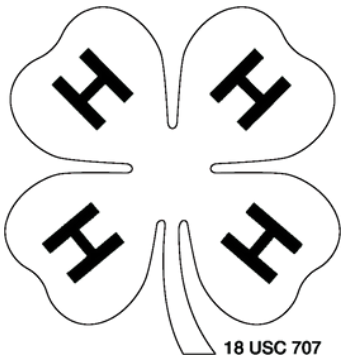

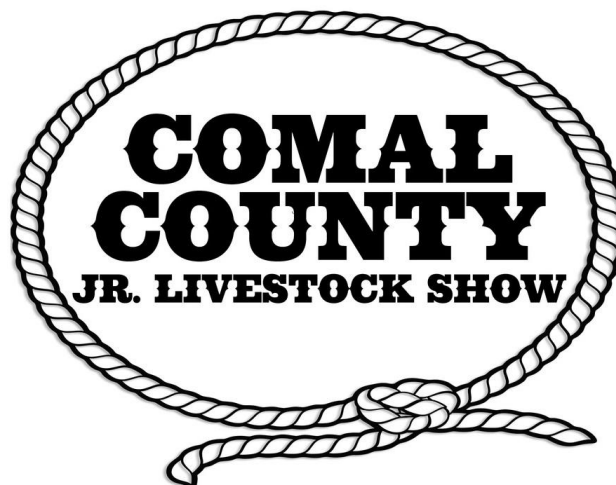

SHOW RULES & REGULATIONS

*The Comal County Junior Livestock Show is a **NEW** Premium show and sale for youth. As such, the exhibitor agrees to the following rules.*

Livestock, Poultry & Rabbits:

1. **LIABILITY RULE – THE CCJLSA WILL IN NO CASE BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY LOSS, INJURY AND/OR DAMAGE THAT MAY OCCUR DURING THE SHOW.**
2. Exhibitors must be supervised by a Comal County Vocational Agriculture Teacher or a Comal County Agent and be enrolled in a Comal County private school, public school, or be home schooled within CISD or NBISD, and provide verification thereof. The exhibitor must be in the third grade or nine years old and be a current member in a 4-H Club or FFA Chapter by November 1st. The Board of Directors will consider waivers on an individual basis. **WAIVERS FOR SHOW ENTRY EXCEPTIONS ARE DUE NO LATER THAN FEBRUARY 1ST.**
3. All exhibitors must be Quality Counts certified through their 4H or FFA program by December 1 of the year prior to the Youth Show. Quality Counts certification number is required at time of entry. Failure to comply with this rule will result in disqualification.
4. An exhibitor may not exhibit and/or sell a market animal in more than one county show.
5. All exhibitors must meet UIL guidelines as determined by their individual school district. Each school system and the Extension service will provide a written list of ineligible students to CCJLSA secretary before judging of any animal or Ag mech project begins. **The deadline is Friday at 5:00 PM before the youth show begins.** Any ineligible exhibitor and their project will not participate.
6. Entry forms will be entered **online or by utilizing the form** on CCJLSA.org - no later than December 1, 2025. The online entries will be approved by the Ag teachers/county agents in the online app. The CEA or FFA Advisor will certify these forms/online entries as a project before being submitted. Forms submitted must be signed by the CEA or FFA advisor and submitted by December 1, 2025.
7. A **non-refundable** entry fee of **\$30.00** per animal must accompany the entry card. Each exhibitor of hooved animals must provide their own shavings. Late entries will be accepted for a non-refundable fee of \$150.00 per animal after December 1, 2024, until February 1, 2025. Entries submitted between February 2 until the day of weigh in at the show will be accepted for a \$300 late entry fee. Individuals may enter no more than two (2) steers, two (2) hogs, two (2) goats, two (2) pens of broilers, two (2) turkeys, two (2) lambs and two (2) pens of rabbits in the market classes and two (2) breeding animals. Only the number of entries that were submitted by each exhibitor are allowed on the premises.
8. **UPDATE** Official weight will be taken when the animal crosses the scale at weigh-in. Exhibitors will get two chances to weigh animals on the official scale if under or over the allotted weight. If on first weigh-in, the animal weighs in the allotted weight ranges, the official weight will be taken as so. An immediate second weight attempt may be made. If the animal is over or under the allotted weight range after the second attempt, the animal is sifted and disqualified from the show.
9. Validation rules and dates for hogs, lambs, goats, steers, and heifers will comply with State validation guidelines.
10. Sale money will not be given out at the show but will be given at a later date. The checks must be cashed within 90 days of the sale check date, or all money will be forfeited.
11. All judges' and classifiers' decisions will be final and may not be protested. One or more classifiers may be used in each division at the discretion of the Association.
12. All protests on other matters must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$100, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protest must plainly state the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the Executive Secretary immediately after the occasion for such protest. ***Only those members of the CCJLSA, having paid their dues as of December 1, 2025, may file a protest.***
13. All livestock, poultry and rabbits will be placed into four (4) groups according to quality. Ribbons will be given for the four places: blue, red, and white ribbons are eligible for the Sale; green participant ribbons for those ineligible for the Sale. In the large animal divisions, the Grand Champion will be selected from the first-place animals of each class; Reserve Champion animal will be selected from the remaining first-place animals plus the

animal that stood second in the class from which the champion was selected. Grand Champion, Reserve Champion, Breed Champions, and Reserve Breed Champions must be blue ribbon quality. To be a Breed Champion, there must be competition. The Division Superintendents, in accordance with the rules for their respective division shall set classes and breeds for market animals. Grand and Reserve Grand Ag mechanics projects and first in each class will be eligible to sell in the auction (for a maximum total of 10 projects). These items will be sold as premium only. Money from the sale and add-ons will be distributed through the points system. There will be a Grand and Reserve champion overall, and 1st place blue, blue, red and white ribbons may be awarded in each division.

Points will be awarded as listed below:

Grand Champion	30 points
Reserve Grand Champion	25 points
Class winning Blue Ribbon	12 points
Blue Ribbon	9 points
Red Ribbon	6 points
White Ribbon	3 points

14. Junior, Intermediate and Senior Showmanship awards will be given in each division and will be based on showing and fitting. The exhibitor's neatness in appearance and dress will be taken into consideration. The exhibitor must own the animal and must have submitted and shown the entry in that division. Showmanship classes will be a separate class in each division and classes are as follows:
 - a. Junior exhibitors are those 8 years old and in Grade 3 (or 9 years old) through grade 5; Intermediate exhibitors are those in grades 6 through 8; Senior exhibitors are those in grades 9 through 12. Showmanship will be a separate class in each division. In each level, junior/intermediate/senior, the superintendent may use their discretion to divide entries into smaller classes.
 - b. A special rotating showmanship trophy will be awarded in each of the four large animal divisions. The recipient will be selected from among the winners of each age group competing against each other in special judging. Awards are as follows: **Cattle Division** – *Cattle Showmanship* - Helen and Wilton Steubing Honorary Trophy; *Grand Champion Steer* – Charlie Pfluger; **Swine Division** – *Swine showmanship* - Larry Kraft Memorial Trophy; *Grand Champion Swine* – Ronnie Wunderlich Memorial Trophy; **Goat Division** - *Champion Goat Showmanship* – Reggie Wuest Memorial Trophy, *Reserve Champion Goat Showmanship* – Alvin & Clara Saur Memorial Trophy; **Lamb Division** – *Senior Showmanship* -Fred & Mary Ploch Memorial Trophy, **Rabbit Division** - Maureen Dunckel Best-in Show Rabbit Trophy.
15. Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering their animals and cleaning their stalls or pens during the show and through the sale.
16. Grand Champions and Reserve Grand Champions in all species will be drug tested including poultry and rabbits. Random testing will be administered at the discretion of the Comal County Junior Livestock Show Association. Un-ethical fitting will be deemed to consist of changing the normal conformation of any part of the animal's body or using drugs including over the counter and/or extra-label, or mechanical devices to alter the physical makeup and/or performance of the animal. Fitting guidelines/rules are as follows: The exhibitor is expected to feed, care for, fit and exhibit their animal/project while at the Comal County Junior Livestock Show. If needed, the exhibitor may have the assistance of the exhibitor's family, AST, CEA, 4H adult volunteer or other 4H/FFA members. Any project fed or cared for by a custom fitter is not eligible to show. A custom fitter is considered to be anyone who is NOT a family member, AST, CEA, local 4H adult volunteer or another 4H/FFA member. Violators of this rule may be barred from future participation in the Comal County Junior Livestock Show.
17. In the event any animal is declared by the veterinarian or testing agency to be unethically fitted the Executive Committee is authorized to permanently bar the exhibitor from any further participation in the Comal County Jr. Livestock Show. The exhibitor will forfeit all titles, awards, prizes, auction proceeds, premiums, and scholarships. Disqualification by this rule will not affect class or championship placement and sale of lower placed animals.
18. All owners or persons in charge of property, or livestock, shall care for, guard, protect, and preserve the same. THE CCJLSA IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR THE ACTS OF THIRD PARTIES.

19. Health certificates are not required. However, no animal may be exhibited or remain on the show grounds that is not healthy or is the carrier of any disease. Animals that develop illness at the show must be treated by a licensed veterinarian at the expense of the owner, and only with the knowledge of the Show Superintendent. Those animals requiring any drug or chemical administration that might produce a chemical residue will be excused from competition and sale and must be immediately removed from the premises.
20. The hog/steer division superintendents will assign stalls and pens by Wednesday of the show week. The superintendents may reassign stalls and pens as needed. No equipment may be brought on to the grounds prior to noon Wednesday except for rabbits, poultry, goats, and lambs. Hog equipment may be brought on to the grounds beginning at 8 AM on Wednesday and Steer equipment may be brought on the grounds beginning at 10 AM on Thursday.
21. It is the sole responsibility of the exhibitor to bring out the animal or animals when the class is called. No animal may be brought into the ring once judging has begun. No complaints or protest on the grounds that an entry was overlooked will be considered. If an entry is not judged, the exhibitor forfeits the right to sell the animal in the sale. If the animal is not exhibited in its class, for any reason, it is the property of the exhibitor and must be removed from the grounds immediately.
22. All market animals and poultry will be ear tagged, tattooed, banded, or paint branded. No persons other than exhibitors and officials appointed by the division superintendent may be in the classification area during classification or in the show ring during judging. No CEA or FFA Advisor may be in the show ring during judging.
23. Exhibitors must show their own animals unless they have more than one animal in a class, in case of a family or medical emergency, or other extenuating circumstance as approved by the Division Superintendent. Substitute exhibitors must be eligible in accordance with rules 2 and 3. The animal's owner is to furnish the substitute showman's name in writing to the Division Superintendent prior to judging.
24. No market animal will be allowed to leave the barn without a signed release from the division superintendent. Premium swine may be released following the conclusion of the show on Thursday Poultry may be removed after judging of both turkey and broiler show is complete. All poultry shall be removed from the show barn no later than 30 minutes after the completion of showmanship.
25. All Sale animals must be photographed with the exhibitor for the auction slide show. All exhibitors shall be responsible for mailing a "thank you" letter to the buyer.
26. No dogs will be allowed on the grounds during the show and sale, with the exception of service animals per ADA compliance.
27. No clipping is allowed on the show grounds. Only hand shears and cordless clippers may be used for touching up.
28. No change in entries may be made after weigh-in.
29. Once the species break sheets have been posted, no changes will be made to the assignment of the exhibitor to the specific tag of the animal unless the CCJLSA staff incorrectly entered the data.
30. **NEW** Once an animal is dispositioned in the office and the exhibitor/parent signs the disposition card, changes will be accepted with a \$50 fee per change. If the sale book has been finalized, no changes to the sale order or announcement during the sale will be made. Only the points will be updated, and the exhibitor will receive the points for the corrected entry.
31. Dress Code: All exhibitors will be required to wear appropriate show attire during the show, sale and in all pictures taken by the show photographer. Shorts, tank tops, low-cut shirts, sheer blouses, open-toed shoes/sandals/flip flops, t-shirts, ball caps or bare midriffs are not acceptable. Cowboy hats are acceptable for the Auction.
32. **NEW** Any exhibitor or adult assisting the exhibitor that uses profanity or physical aggression toward a CCJLSA member will be immediately required to leave the premises.
33. All exhibitors of hooved animals must provide their own shavings for their pen and shavings ARE required.
34. All ear tags other than State Validation, Texas Lamb Breeders Association, Texas Goat Breeders Association, and USDA Scrapie tags must be removed prior to arrival on show grounds.
35. No exhibitor can wear anything in the show ring that could be obviously seen as a way to identify themselves to the judge (i.e. wearing a vest with initials on it)

36. All rule change recommendations from the General Membership of the Association must be submitted in writing to a director or officer of the Association by the April board meeting and can only be voted on at the May General Membership meeting.
37. Each exhibitor is responsible for advising the livestock office of the disposition of their entries thirty minutes after their last animal has shown and must have their photo taken by the show photographer prior to declaring their disposition. Any exhibitor who fails to declare at this time will be presumed to waive their sale place. Final declaration for sale will close 1 hour after the last animal has shown.
38. No animal may be decorated with paint or any other item to alter its appearance in any way during the show or sale.
39. One judge per species – regardless of breeding show included in species. No separate showmanship judges will be hired.
40. No judge/classifier or registrar can be related to any exhibitor in the animal species they are judging.
- 41. VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THESE RULES WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION OF THE ENTRY.**

Market Steers

1. Exhibitors must show ownership of steer by June 30 and must be Texas validated.
2. Each steer must weigh a **minimum of NEW 950 pounds** with no upper weight limit. Steers will be shown at the actual weighed in weight. The maximum pay weight will be **1500** pounds. Steers not making weight will be required to leave Thursday after weigh-in until 10 PM.
3. Classification criteria will be as follows:
 - a. American Division
 - b. British Division
 - c. AOB Division
4. All market steer breeds will be divided into the following classes:
 - 15 steers or less – 2 classes (light and heavy)
 - 16 – 23 steers – 3 classes
 - 24 – 31 steers – 4 classes
 - 32 – 39 steers – 5 classes
 - More classes may be added if there are more than 39 steers in a breed.
5. Steers will be slick shorn to 1/4 inches or less prior to arrival.
6. Exhibitors will be asked to remove the animal from the grounds if control of the animal cannot be maintained at all times in the opinion of the Division Superintendent and at least three Directors of the Association. Removal will constitute disqualification of the entry.
7. All steers, unless scurried, must be de-horned.
8. All steers must be haltered for shipping.
9. No clipping will be allowed on the showgrounds. Only hand shears and cordless clippers may be used for touch ups.
10. No steer displays may be set up before Thursday at 10 AM.

Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering their animals and cleaning their stalls or pens during the show

1. Exhibitors must show ownership by October 31st and must be Texas validated.
2. Each entry must weigh a minimum of 90 pounds for Dorper and Southdown. Finewool, Finewool Cross, and Medium Wool lambs must weigh a minimum of 100 pound with **NEW** no maximum weight required. Entry will be shown at the actual weight at weight in.
3. Ewes or wethers may be shown.
4. Baby teeth do not need to be intact.
5. Each entry must be sheared above hocks and knees within 10 days prior to arrival. No clipping is allowed on the show grounds. Only hand shears and cordless clippers may be used for touch up.
6. Lambs will be classified at the time of weigh in. Lambs will be shown in the following order: Southdown, Fine Wool, Fine Wool Cross, Dorper and Medium Wool.
7. Must have a minimum of 10 head to have a Breed Champion or Reserve Breed Champion winner. If less than 10 head – they will show in 1 class and the 12-point Class champion will be the highest award given.

Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering their animals and cleaning their stalls or pens during the show.

Market Swine

1. Exhibitors must show ownership of hogs by November 30th and must be Texas validated.
2. Hogs must weigh a minimum of **235 pounds with a maximum weight limit of 285 pounds**. Entries will be shown at the actual weight weighed in. **NEW** There will be a 3 pound weight tolerance given on top or bottom weights.. There will be no super-heavy weight class.
3. All sifted swine must be removed on Wednesday after weigh-in is complete.
4. Entries may be either barrows or gilts.
5. Market swine will be classified and shown in this order: **Berkshire, Duroc, Hampshire, Yorkshire, White OPB, Dark OPB and Crossbreeds**. White OPB will consist of Chester and Landrace. Dark OPB will consist of Spots, Poland China, and Hereford.
6. All market swine breeds will be divided into the following categories:
 - 1 – 12 hogs in a breed will be one class regardless of weight
 - 13 – 24 hogs in a breed will be divided into two classes
 - 3rd class will be 25 – 36 hogs in a breed
 - 4th class will be 37 – 48 hogs in a breed
 - 5th class will be 49 – 60 hogs in a breed
 - Additional classes can be added at the Superintendent's discretion.
7. Hogs may be washed with water and shampoo, but not shown with any foreign substance such as oils, lotions, creams, or aerosol sprays.
8. All hogs are to remain within the loading/unloading gates at all times during the Show..
9. No tack or equipment may be unloaded into pens unless show pigs are present and ready to be unloaded. **There MUST be 2 hogs per pen.**
10. Hog wash rack will be closed during hog weigh in.

Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering their animals and cleaning their stalls or pens during the show.

Rabbits

1. Rabbits will be judged by a licensed ARBA judge to meet ARBA standards. Rabbit division will have an ARBA certified registrar to pre-check and sift all rabbits during check-in. Judge may also serve as registrar if certified.
2. A pen of rabbits must consist of three (3) fryers of one recognized breed and variety, with each weighing 3 ½ to 5 ½ pounds. At weigh in, all rabbits will be weighed on a digital scale certified by committee, CEA's and AST's prior to weigh in.
3. Sifted pens of rabbits will be taken home.
4. Entries must be free of disease.
5. Meat pens must not be more than 70 days old on the day of the show.
6. Meat pen rabbits must be validated on February 1, 2026. Validation will be held at the Comal County Fairgrounds from 1:00 PM – 4:00 PM.. Rabbits must be owned at the time of validation. All exhibitors must be present at the time of validation. Rabbit validation will not occur before 35 days following the birth date.
7. If more than 70 meat pens are classified for the show, classes will be split at the discretion of the show committee. Classes will be as even as possible and posted following the weigh-in. Each division will have a Champion and Reserve Champion. The overall Grand Champion will be chosen from the division champions, the Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from the remaining champions, and the reserve champion from the division from which the Grand Champion was selected.
8. Grand and Reserve Champion rabbits will be brought back for the day of the auction.

Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering their animals and cleaning their stalls or pens during the show.

Broilers

1. Broilers must be acquired from a hatch selected at the Superintendent's discretion and will be ordered through the exhibitor's Agriculture advisor or County Extension Agent. Each exhibitor MAY order an individual set of birds (up to 75) OR siblings withing the same household may order and share a set of birds (up to 75). For broiler orders, a minimum order per exhibitor of 25 birds or a minimum order per a family of 50 birds, with a maximum order of 75 birds (in increments of 25 birds). For broilers selected from a Major show hatch, exhibitors may enter broilers from the designated wing band series in both the County and Major show. If the exhibitor wishes to order a second box from the same hatch with a designated wing band series eligible only for the major show – birds from that series will not be permitted at the County Show.
2. A pen of broilers must consist of three pullets or three cockerels per pen. No mixed pens.
3. There will be a Cockerel show and a Pullet show. The champion of each division will show for the Grand Champion Broiler.
4. Broilers will have wing band numbers assigned to the exhibitor at the time the chicks were purchased. Broilers without valid band numbers will not be eligible to be shown.
5. Broilers will be fed and watered by the exhibitor during the show or entry will be disqualified.

Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering their animals and cleaning their stalls or pens during the show.

Turkeys

1. Turkeys must be owned by the exhibitor. The exhibitor must have started with at least ten “one day old” poults each from TAMU turkey hatch in order to qualify as a legitimate project.
2. There will be a tom show and a hen show. The champion of each division will show for Grand Champion Turkey.
3. Turkeys will have wing band numbers assigned to the exhibitor’s family at the time the poults were purchased. Turkeys without valid band numbers will not be eligible to be shown. Bands **MUST** be removed from all Market birds by the exhibitor or their parent/guardian. **All wing bands of Market birds must be turned into the livestock office by the exhibitor no later than 2 hours after their last animal entry has shown. Failure to do so will result in disqualification of the entry.**
4. Turkeys must be fed and watered by the exhibitor during the show or entry will be disqualified.

Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering their animals and cleaning their stalls or pens during the show.

Wether Goats

1. **Exhibitors must show ownership of goats by October 31st and must be Texas validated.**
2. Wether goats of any breed or crossbreed may be shown.
3. Goats must weigh a minimum of 65 pounds with a **maximum weight limit of 125 pounds**. Goats will be shown at the actual weigh-in weight and will be divided equally into weight classes at the discretion of the superintendent. Sifted goats will be subject to a different floor price from show and sale animals.
4. Goats must be shorn above the knees and hocks to within 3/8 inch of skin or less before arrival on the grounds. Goats must be dehorned or tipped. Re-growth is acceptable if tipped. No removal of horns allowed on grounds. No painting, powdering or artificial coloring of animals will be allowed. No clipping allowed on the show grounds. Only hand shears and cordless clippers may be used for touching up.
5. Entries must be taught to lead and may be shown with a halter or collar. Bracing will be allowed at the judge's discretion.
6. There will be **12 Classes** divided by **3 weight divisions**. After classes 1,2, 3 and 4 show, the top two blue ribbon goats in each class will come back to show for the Lightweight champion and reserve champion. After classes 5, 6, 7 and 8 show, the top two blue ribbon goats in each class will come back to show for medium weight champion and reserve champion. After classes 9, 10, 11 and 12 show, the top two blue ribbon goats in each class will come back to show for the Heavy weight champion and reserve champion. **The Light, Medium, and Heavy weight Champions and Reserve Champions will then compete for Grand and Reserve Champion.**

Example:

Class 1: Top 2 Goats

Class 2: Top 2 Goats

Class 3: Top 2 Goats

Class 4: Top 2 Goats

**** These 8 goats will return to the ring to be judged for Lightweight champion and reserve champion.**

Each exhibitor is responsible for feeding and watering their animals and cleaning their stalls or pens during the show.

Breeding Livestock

LIABILITY RULE – THE SHOW ASSOCIATION WILL IN NO CASE BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ANY LOSS, INJURY AND/OR DAMAGE THAT MAY OCCUR DURING THE SHOW.

1. All general rules will apply.
2. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion trophies will be awarded to the Champion and Reserve heifers. Reserve Champion animals will be selected from the remaining first place animals plus the animal which stood second in the class from which the Champion was selected.
3. Breeding animals may be released **after the show Friday by 10 PM**. No animals may be moved during the sale. Before removal, all animals must have a signed release from the division superintendent.

Entries close December 1 in all breeding divisions.

Junior Breeding Heifers

Exhibitors must present **a copy of** registration papers **with entry and original registration papers with heifers at time of check-in**. Heifers with incorrect registration papers, tattoos or other identification problems will be sifted and not allowed to show. Tattoos and/or brands must match the registration papers exactly. This information must be in order upon arrival at the show.

Rules

1. Entry: Each exhibitor may enter two (2) heifers. Heifers will be shown by American, English, and Exotic divisions.
2. Ownership/Registration: Animals must be registered in the herd book of their Association in the name of the junior owner on or before November 1, the year preceding the show. Purchase, delivery, possession, transfer, and registration must all take place on or before November 1st, the year preceding the show. Superintendents will check Original Registration Certificates at time of check-in. Registration Certificates must be available at all times.
3. Judging: Overall Supreme Champion & Reserve Supreme Champion Heifer will be judged at the conclusion of the Show. All Division Champions and Reserve Division Champions must participate in the Supreme Champion Heifer Drive or be subject to disqualification. The decision of the judge is final.
4. Grooming Materials: No adhesive materials allowed. This is a “Blow and Go” Show. No trim chutes. Special Rules: Owners must comply with the special rules of the respective breed associations as stated in the San Antonio Premium Book. (www.sarodeo.com)
5. Overall Supreme Champion heifer will receive \$750 in premium money. The Reserve Supreme Heifer will receive \$500 in premium money. A premium payout for all division heifer classes 1st and 2nd placing, Champion and Reserve divisions will also receive a premium payout.

Classes

The following Classes will apply for all division:

Heifer calves – calved after January 1, 2025

Junior Heifers – calved May 1, 2024 – December 31, 2024

Senior Heifers – calved September 1, 2023– April 30, 2024

SALE RULES AND REGULATIONS

Sale of Market and Premium Animals will begin with an opening ceremony at 10:00 AM on Saturday, March 7, 2026

- 1- Eligible animals will be designated Premium Sale at declaration.
2. Animals will sell in the following order: **Rabbits, Lambs, Goats, Steers, Hogs Turkeys, Broilers and Ag Mech**, Steers will ALWAYS sell 4th in Sale order with hogs selling immediately preceding or after the steers. **All Grand Champion and Reserve champion by Species will sell first, followed by all remaining animals in the sale order listed above.** Each Grand Champion and Reserve Champion exhibitor is responsible to bring his/her own animal to the sale ring in the correct sale list order. No other hooved animals or rabbits will cross the auction stage. Only Grand Champion turkey and broiler pens will be brought to the auction stage. The exhibitor is required to wear a number corresponding to his/her sale order number. In the event of a conflicting UIL, FFA/ 4-H sanctioned event, or a school sponsored event that is sanctioned by the school and is supervised by a teacher of that school, request for a substitute exhibitor must be submitted in writing to the Board of Directors. **All waivers must be submitted by the advisers on letterhead and with signature.** The Board's decision will be given to the exhibitor prior to the show. A substitute exhibitor may be used in the event of a family or medical emergency **with a note from the physician on letterhead.**
- 3- Grand Champion, Breed Champions, Reserve Breed Champions as well as Blue, Red, and White ribbon animals will be eligible to sell and will be sold in the order of priority stated- Ownership of the animals will stay with that exhibitor.
4. No exhibitor may sell more than one unit in the sale, a unit being one animal, one pen of broilers, one turkey, or one pen of rabbits. If an exhibitor has more than one Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion placed, the exhibitor must sell them as stated in Rule 3. However, the exhibitor will receive the money on only one of those units. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the unit that he/she does not receive money on. No exceptions for animal species or sex. The money on the unit the exhibitor chooses to sell will be divided among the entries in that species according to the point system. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to choose which unit he/she will sell at time of disposition.
5. All livestock will be sold at the weight recorded by the Show's Official scales. Sale weights will not exceed 1,500 pounds for steers, 180 pounds for lambs, 285 pounds for hogs and 125 pounds for goats.
6. The Association will retain ten percent (10%) of all monies raised of Sale animals and ag mechanics projects.
7. **ON SALE DAY NO EXHIBITOR OR FAMILY MEMBER MAY APPROACH A BUYER CONCERNING THE RETURN OF ANY ANIMAL IN THE SALE. VIOLATION OF THIS RULE WILL RESULT IN ALL PRIZES AND MONEY BEING FORFEITED.**
8. Each exhibitor is responsible for advising the livestock office of the disposition of their entries thirty minutes after their last animal is shown and must have their photo taken by the show photographer prior to declaring their disposition. Any exhibitor who fails to declare at this time will be presumed to waive their sale place. Final declaration for sale will close 1 hour after the last animal has shown.
9. Sale money will be re-distributed to exhibitors by a point system. Each exhibitor will receive an amount commensurate with the award his/her entry earned in the show.

10. All net undesignated money contributed to the Association must be used in that year's sale. Distribution of these funds shall be as follows:
- All funds designated for a specific animal division shall be used in that division. Undesignated funds, i.e., Silent Auction, etc. will be distributed to each animal division based on the percentage of total sale points accumulated in each division that year. These funds are to be used in the sale, as needed, or added to the points after the sale.

11. The Association reserves the right to withhold an exhibitor's check if the parent or guardian of said exhibitor has a past due balance with the Association.

The Point System Purpose

The point system was developed and designed to reward each exhibitor for the quality of his/her entry in the show.

How does it work?

- Each entry in the division is assigned a certain number of points in accordance with the table in Rule 12 in Sale Rules and Regulations. The points for all entries in the division are totaled.
- The amount bid is totaled for all the sold entries in each division. Ten percent (10%) of the money is thereby retained by the Association for operating expenses and capital improvements.
- The remainder of the money is divided by the total points from "1" above to establish a point value per division.
- Each selling exhibitor receives the point value times the number of points their entry earned,

Examples (from the 2025 Auction)

Steer Division:

Division Point value equals \$490.94

A 1,200-pound red ribbon steer can earn:

$$6 \text{ points} \times \$490.94 \text{ per point} = \$2945.64$$

Turkey Division:

Division Point value equals \$241.69

A white ribbon turkey can earn:

$$3 \text{ points} \times \$241.69 \text{ per point} = \$725.07$$

Goat Division:

Division Point value equals \$285.98

A 110-pound blue ribbon goat can earn:

$$9 \text{ points} \times \$285.98 \text{ per point} = \$2573.82$$

Purpose of the CCJLSA Agricultural Mechanics Project Show

The purpose of the CCJLSA Junior Agricultural Mechanics Project Show is to encourage learning and development of Agricultural Mechanics skills through competition and to display to the public, through exhibits, some of the values of Agricultural Science Training.

Rules for the Agricultural Mechanics Project Show

1. **Exhibitor Eligibility:** Exhibitors must be supervised by a Comal County Vocational Agriculture teacher or a Comal County Agent and be enrolled in a Comal County private school, public school, or be in the third grade or nine years old and be a bona fide member in a 4-H Club or FFA Chapter by November 1. The Board of Directors will consider waivers on an individual basis. Exhibitors must be under twenty years of age as of January 1, 2026.
2. **Project Construction:** All projects must be designed and constructed in a school or home shop under the direct supervision of an AST, 4-H Club Manager, or County Agent. **All projects must be approved by a CEA or AST and all entry applications must be signed by a CEA or AST before submission.**
3. **Construction Date:** Projects previously exhibited at the CCJLSA Jr. Ag. Mech. Project Show will not be eligible to be entered. Projects must be constructed within one calendar year of the exhibition date.
4. **Types of Projects:** Only projects that fit into the stated classes will be accepted. Final project classification will be at the discretion of show officials. Projects which have been built from kits will not be eligible to show. Project must fit the description of the project entered on the entry application or it may be held ineligible to be shown.
5. **Entry Application:** Deadline for completed entry forms to be submitted to the CCJLSA is December 20, 2025, or last day of school before winter break. A separate entry form must be submitted for each project entry and a \$15.00 entry paid for each exhibitor entered. **All blanks on each entry application must be completed.**
6. **Project Substitution:** There will be NO substitution of projects. The project entered on the entry form must be the item brought to the show.
7. **Exhibitors Substitutions:** All exhibitors' names for a project must be listed on the original entry application form for each project. No exhibitors may be substituted after the entry application form has been submitted. Exhibitors may only be dropped from a project by written notification to the CCJLSA by the CEA or AST.
8. **Group Entries:** Group entries must include only the names of the exhibitors who participated in the planning and construction of the project on the entry application. **A Group entry can have a maximum of six team members per project only. CCJLSA will only provide 4 buckles maximum to any winning project.**
9. **Number of Entries:** No exhibitor may be involved with more than 2 projects, whether group or individually constructed. Again, the name(s) of all individual or team exhibitors for each project must be on the original entry application form.
10. **Project Description:** A description of the project must be included on the entry application. **Be specific, concise, and correct with your description.** For example, do not describe it as just a "16 ft. trailer", it would better to describe the project as a "16 ft. bumper pull livestock trailer". The project brought to the show must fit the description of the project entered on the entry application or it may be rejected and held ineligible to be shown.

11. **Project Classification:** You must put your project classification on your entry application. The CCJLSA Ag. Mechanics Committee will have the final discretion to move a project to a different class if, in its opinion, the project has not been correctly entered.
12. **Project Completeness:** Any unfinished project with workmanship not up to standards or any project with safety issues may be sifted from show. All projects must be approved by the CEA or AST before entering. No finishing or painting of projects will be allowed on the CCJLSA show grounds. Any project with wet paint or finish work must remain outside of the grounds until ready. Judges will be advised to disregard minor blemishes, scratches, etc. that may occur during transporting project or assembly on the grounds.
13. **Vehicles:** Vehicles pulling or hauling entries to the grounds must be removed from the project show area immediately after entries are unloaded and will only be allowed back in at designated time for project release. Trucks, tractors, or other vehicles are allowed, if necessary, as part of the project display at the discretion of the show officials only.
14. **Safety:** For projects needing support, appropriate and safe display stands are to be provided by the exhibitor, as necessary. Sharp edges and points on all projects are to be covered as necessary to prevent possible injury.
15. **Projects with Engines:** No more than two gallons of fuel in any fuel tank is allowed. The fuel tank cap is to be in place. Equipment equipped with a battery must be disconnected. Tractors in the restoration class may have up to 5 gallons of fuel in the tank. All entries with engines or motors must remain shut off except during loading and unloading of projects when it is necessary. Exhibitors are only allowed to start their engines or run the motor when they are instructed to by either a judge or the ag mechanic superintendent. All entries that have combustible or flammable fuels must be disconnected and stored away when exhibitors are not with their projects (i.e. – propane, butane, acetylene tanks). The Ag mechanics superintendents will store it for the exhibitor if necessary. Projects with fuels tanks will need to have the fuel shut off (i.e. – tractors, welders, small engines)
16. **Transportation:** All trailers and equipment that will be operated and/or transported on public roads must meet with safety equipment specified in Title 7, Vehicles and Traffic Transportation Code of the Texas Statutes. Any trailer that is over wide (102 inches) metal to metal must have a signed permit. Any trailer/project that does not meet standard DOT safety requirements is subject to disqualification. 17. **ASABE:** All 3-point hitch and/or PTO operated equipment must meet the latest ASABE standards. PTO equipment must meet standard S203, and all semi-mounted or mounted equipment must meet standard S217. Reference ASABE Technical Information Library.
18. **Signs:** All projects will be identified with exhibitor cards provided by CCJLSA. Additional signs and banners are encouraged. Exhibitors will be allowed to place a “For Sale” sign on their projects after all judging is completed and ribbons are distributed. The Exhibitor and any potential buyer will complete any transaction for a project independent of the CCJLSA.
19. **Loss or Damage:** Every precaution will be taken to protect projects however, the CCJLSA or the officials will NOT be responsible for any loss or damage to projects.
20. **Failure to comply with rules will result in forfeiture of awards. In addition, all CCJLSA General Show Rules and Regulations apply.**

21. Judging Criteria:

22. Documentation:

- a. Working Drawing - One that demonstrates that the project was constructed from plans. Drawn to scale with lettering and dimensions.
- b. Bill of Materials – A list of materials including description, quantity, size, and costs.
- c. Photographs – Sequenced, labeled, and good quality depicting the exhibitor/s progress during project construction and finish. All photos should show exhibitors demonstrating proper safety procedures.

- d. Standards such as Transportation Codes and ASABE standards as related to project are recommended to be included in project documentation.

23. **Presentation and Knowledge:** Students exhibitors should be appropriately dressed as per CCJLSA General Rules and Regulations and should be able to explain and answer questions regarding the project. This includes technical knowledge about the construction, finish, and operation. Student exhibitor/s should have the ability to safely demonstrate the project upon request of a show official.
24. **Arrival:** All projects must arrive at the grounds and be checked in by the Ag. Mech committee between 9 AM. and 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 3, 2026. If there are more than 10 projects in a division, the Ag Mech Committee may break them into classes of like kinds.
25. **Judging:** Will take place starting at 8:00 a.m. on Wednesday, March 4, 2026. Students must be present at their projects during judging to answer questions and demonstrate operation as requested by the judge/s. Projects with no exhibitor present will not be judged.
26. **Release: Project Release will begin on Saturday, March 2, 2026**
27. **Awards:** announcement will be on Friday afternoon.
28. **Project Showing:** All students are required to spend as much available time as they can with their projects on both **Friday and Saturday** presenting them to the general public as this is part of the purpose for our Show.
29. **Showmanship:** Two showmanship awards (Champion Showmanship and Reserve Champion Showmanship) may be presented to a school, club or individual having presented the best public image. Showmanship will be judged **NEW** during the judging of the projects on show day.. Major considerations of this award are appropriate display of project and documentation, housekeeping, appropriate dress, conduct, attitude, enthusiasm, and participation of exhibitor(s).

Comal County Junior Livestock Association Scholarship Guidelines

1. The Applicant must have participated as an exhibitor for at least 3 years during high school.
2. Applicants are members in good standing in the FFA or 4-H at the time of application.
3. Applicant must have volunteered in the operation of the CCJLSA Wurstfest booth with a legal guardian or during the Youth Show and Sale **for the 3 years** they exhibited in the show **during high school years** **NEW** **for a minimum of 5 hours each year.** **NEW** **Exhibitors can also receive 1 hour credit for each raffle ticket they sell each year.** Students should collect documentation for the activities in which they participated **during high school**. The following information is required:
 - a. Student name and Club Affiliation
 - b. **Signature of Adult** in Charge of any activity in which the student actively participated in to assist the CCJLSA. **NEW** It must be the signature of the chairman of the committee you are volunteering with – not your ag teacher. Volunteer forms with no signatures or incorrect signatures will not be accepted and will disqualify the exhibitor from consideration of the scholarship.

Volunteer forms are available on our website or in the livestock office during the Youth show.

Each of the five high schools and the 4-H program will be provided with three (3) \$1000.00 scholarships to award to students. (The CCJLSA has the final determination of how many scholarships will be offered each year and how much each scholarship will be worth. These decisions will be made by the association based on available funds raised. Scholarship recipients will be selected from applications received from FFA Booster Clubs and the 4-H Extension office. If the schools and 4H program do not fulfill their 3 scholarships, the unfulfilled scholarships will be placed in a pool. The remaining scholarships will be awarded to those students who qualify based on a ranking system but were not selected in the first round of awards.

Winners' names will be given to the organizations for recognition at their Awards programs. The recipients are then required to turn in a copy of **their tuition payment receipt** from the school they are attending and a **thank-you note** to the association to receive payment. The expiration of this scholarship award is April 1st of the following year the award is originally made. No scholarship monies will be awarded until after these two things are complete.

If the student applicant is applying through FFA, the student must fill out a general scholarship application (available in the Counselor's office or Career Center), provide a copy of their transcript, a resume, a personal statement of their future plans to utilize the scholarship money, and they should meet the rules and guidelines provided by the CCJLSA as mentioned above. **The scholarship application is due on the date set by each high school. NO LATE scholarship applications will be accepted by the Association if it is past the high school deadline.** *If the scholarship application is due before the Youth show, the student may turn in their activity's documentation for their senior year to the Livestock office during the Youth show. CCJLSA will assume responsibility for attaching it to the exhibitor's scholarship application. Do NOT turn in any additional documentation to the high school if your scholarship application has already been turned in.*

If the student is applying through 4-H, the student should contact the Extension Service office for other application requirements and further details. They are also required to meet the rules and guidelines provided by the CCJLSA as mentioned above. **The scholarship application is due on the date set by the Extension office. NO LATE scholarship applications will be accepted by the Association if it is past the Extension office deadline.**
